- c) a bill to which SO 230 (c) applies but subject to SO 230 (d);
- d) any petition.
- 2 A petition stands referred after presentation. The committee may refer a petition to another standing committee where the subject matter of the petition is within the terms of reference of that standing committee. A standing committee to which a petition is referred shall report to the House as it thinks fit.

#### 1 Introduction

- 1.1 On October 10 2000 Hon Murray Criddle MLC tabled a petition (*Tabled Paper #335*) requesting action to cut fuel costs.
- 1.2 The petitioners expressed their opposition to the spiralling cost of fuel, particularly the tax and excise component of that increased cost.
- 1.3 The petitioners requested that the Legislative Council recommend that the State Government of Western Australia bring to the attention of the Commonwealth Government the following concerns of Western Australian residents:

The need to:

- (a) The need to [sic] reduce fuel excise to benefit all Australians;
- (b) Suspend the CPI excise adjustment in February 2001;
- (c) Review the alignment of Australian crude oil to world parity pricing;
- (d) Protection of [sic] the role for small business retailers of petrol; and
- (e) Have price competition and transparency at the wholesale level.
- 1.4 The petition contained 11, 223 signatures. The principal petitioner was Mr Peter Fitzpatrick AM, Executive Director of the Motor Trade Association of Western Australia (Inc.).

#### 2 THE COMMITTEE'S RESPONSE TO THE PETITION

2.1 The Committee notes that the Select Committee on Pricing of Petroleum Products tabled its report *Getting a Fair Deal for Western Australian Motorists* in the Legislative Assembly on October 12 2000. The Committee believes that the matters raised in the petition have been substantially dealt with in the Select Committee report.

2.3 The Committee also notes the actions of the Premier and the Leader of the Opposition

supporting a number of issues raised in the petition.

2.4 The Committee is of the view that these matters are of concern to many Western

Australians.

3 RECOMMENDATION

**Recommendation:** The Committee recommends that the State Government of Western Australia reiterate to the Commonwealth Government the concerns of

many Western Australians relating to the need to:

reduce fuel excise to benefit all Australians;

• suspend the CPI excise adjustment in February 2001;

• review the alignment of Australian crude oil to world parity pricing;

• protect the role of small business retailers of petrol; and

• have price competition and transparency at the wholesale level.
