I believe that public land should be opened to recreational hunting not to avail additional land to hunters but to allow the hunters to humanely control introduced and feral species such as foxes, pigs, goats, wild dogs, cats, donkeys, camels, horses and rabbits (which will be referred to as Feral animals). Hunting has been a part of my life since I was a little boy and I have been able to see firsthand how fast these feral animals are breeding and spreading through our lands. My father taught me how to hunt and shoot and I am honoured that I am able to do the same with my son. I can only hope that in the next generations to come that my son will still have the same freedoms and opportunities to do the same with his children.

Using hunters will be a cost effective way for the government to control the feral animal population in Australia. With all this said I am quite surprised that this idea was not considered sooner, however I applaud the government for the forward thinking to save our native flora and fauna.

I look forward to hearing that this environmentally sound solution has been approved.
