Active Management of Shack Sites		
Recommendation 2: The Committee recommends that the responsible Minister and/or managing authority of each shack site conducts a review of shacks to ascertain whether the shack is being occupied by the owner (leaseholder) or another person permitted to use the shack.	Accepted	The State Government Squatter Policy does not allow for a transfer of shack leases. This is consistent with the view that people should not gain a financial advantage from land that does not belong to them. The State Government supports this position and accepts the recommendation that there is a need to ascertain whether a shack is being occupied by the leaseholder or another person permitted to use the shack. Some local government authorities have accepted that shacks do change hands and have allowed legitimate transfers of leases under their lease arrangements. This situation exists for shacks managed by local government authorities at Naval Base, Windy Harbour and Peaceful Bay.
Recommendation 3: The Committee recommends that the responsible Minister and/or managing authority immediately remove any abandoned shack unless there is a decision to actively manage the shack for public use or another public purpose.	Accepted	The State Government supports the recommendation to remove abandoned shacks immediately. Abandoned shacks will only be retained by the Government for the purpose of public use if they meet environmental, planning, safety, health and building code standards.
Recommendation 4: The Committee recommends that the Government confirm the policy that no new shacks will be permitted on public land, and the responsible Minister or appropriate managing authority should ensure that any unauthorised new shack erected is immediately removed.	Accepted	The State Government supports the recommendation to confirm the policy that no new shacks are to be permitted on public lands and that any unauthorised new shacks that are erected should be immediately removed. The Government will continue to monitor and prevent the erection of additional shacks on public lands.

Recommendation 5: The Committee recommends that where an Aboriginal heritage site is located on, or in close proximity to, a shack site, the responsible Minister and/or the managing authority should take action to ensure that the shacks and shack occupants do not pose any threat or risk to the Aboriginal heritage site.	Accepted	The State Government acknowledges that Aboriginal heritage sites are protected under the provisions of the <i>Aboriginal Heritage Act 1972</i> and should be managed accordingly.
Shacks at Wedge and Grey		
Recommendation 6: The Committee recommends that the responsible Minister and managing authority instruct leaseholders and shack owners to remove the shacks at Wedge and Grey and, as a priority, develop the area to provide the public with low impact, nature-based, affordable visitor facilities and accommodation, including camping and caravanning facilities.	Accepted with qualification	The State Government will examine options for Wedge and Grey that meet the requirements for public recreation and tourism use in conjunction with a level of shack retention that contributes to the opportunities for public use. This consideration would be in consultation with current shack leaseholders. Any future development of the sites will be subject to State planning requirements and will address equity of access and use, building safety, health and amenity, coastal processes and provide for environmentally sustainable public outcomes.

Recommendation 7: The Committee recommends that the responsible Minister and Department of Environment and Conservation, the managing authority, work with the Lower Donnelly River Conservation Association with the aim of retaining the huts for use by the public and members of the association, on condition that the huts meet health, building and safety standards.	Accepted	The State Government notes the recommendation and will work with the Lower Donnelly River Conservation Association with the aim of retaining the huts for the public and members of the Association on the condition that they meet environmental, safety, health and building code standards. The Shannon and D'Entrecasteaux National Park Management Plan 1987-1997, which is being reviewed, will incorporate this outcome.
Shacks at the Blowholes (Quobba)		
Recommendation 8: The Committee recommends that the responsible Minister urgently consults with the Shire of Carnarvon and resolves the issue of the future of the Blowholes shack site.	Accepted	The State Government will consult with the Shire of Carnarvon to progress the Blowholes Master Plan and consider any other requirements for the site by Government.

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
