1. Meeting of Council

The Council assembled at 3.00pm pursuant to order.

The President, Hon John Cowdell, took the Chair and read prayers.

Hon Derrick Tomlinson presented a petition from 454 residents of Western Australia opposing the ban on the docking of tails of certain breeds of dogs. (Tabled paper 448).

6. Railway (Jandakot to Perth) Bill 2002 - Contingent Notice of Motion - Referral to the Standing Committee on Public Administration and Finance

Hon Peter Foss: To move on the next day of sitting -

That upon Order of the Day No. 72 the *Railway (Jandakot to Perth) Bill 2002* being called on, I shall move that Motion No. 9, *Perth Urban Rail Development - Tabling of Questions and Referral to Standing Committee on Public Administration and Finance* be dealt with prior to considering Order of the Day No. 72 and that it continue to be dealt with in priority to that Order of the Day whenever that Order of the Day is called on until disposed of.

Point of Order

Minister for Housing and Works raised the following Point of Order -

As I understand it, that would be a contingency motion. I understand that a long time ago the Chair of this House asked for, and secured, an agreement whereby contingency motions would not be deployed in this House until they were further considered and a decision reached by the Standing Orders Committee. In the time in which I was Leader of the Opposition, I complied with the request of the Chair, which I would have thought is a request that still stands. I seek the President's early ruling on whether a contingency motion provision has now suddenly been provided for through some mechanism that at least I am unaware of.

President's Ruling

The President ruled as follows -

I will give consideration to the Point of Order that has been raised prior to the issue coming up. It is a notice of motion at the moment, and I will give consideration to that Point of Order.

7. Australian Involvement in Military Action in Iraq

Motion No. 6 having been called.

Debate resumed on the motion of Hon Dee Margetts as follows -

That this House notes -

- (1) The recent comments from the Prime Minister and Minister for Foreign Affairs regarding Australia's possible support for US military action in Iraq.
- (2) That these comments were made in the absence of any United Nations resolution or processes.
- (3) The threat to the livelihood of Western Australian agricultural producers and exporters in light of the Prime Minister's indication that any request for Australian assistance would be considered against the "national interest test".

- (4) The statements from Labour Leader Simon Crean that Mr Howard's and Mr Downer's statements are out of step with other international opinion.
- (5) The likely impact on the civilian population, particularly women and children.

Therefore, the Legislative Council informs the Federal Government that is does not support Australian involvement in military action in Iraq without UN backing.

Debate ensued.

8. Order of Business - Point of Order

The Leader of the House raised the following Point of Order -

In relation to the Order of Business before the House. Honourable Members will note that I have asked that the Order of Business on the Business Program be structured to make Order of the Day No. 1 the Address-in-Reply and Order of Day No. 2 the Animal Welfare Bill 2001. I did that for convenience because I could not think of any other way to do it. I remind Honourable Members that on November 7 last, the House considered a motion that the Order of the Day for the Animal Welfare Bill 2001 be made the first Order of the Day for today and subsequently during that day the House in its wisdom made a decision by an absolute majority to support that motion. My difficulty, Mr President, is that we are constrained by the Standing Orders of the House which place the Address-in-Reply as the first Order of the Day. It seems that having made the determination that the Order of the Day in respect of another Order of the Day, specifically No. 36, be made the first Order of the Day, we are in a difficult situation because the Standing Orders prohibit the effect of the motion which was carried by an absolute majority on Thursday. It seems that the motion is a nullity. Mr President, I ask for your view on this matter. It is essentially a moot point because the Government seeks to achieve nothing out of this because clearly it wants to deal with the Animal Welfare Bill. It seems that we either deal with it first or not at all in respect of the manner in which we proceed through the business today.

President's Ruling

The President ruled as follows -

The advice of the Leader of the House is correct. A motion was passed last week that the *Animal Welfare Bill 2001* be considered as the first item today, Tuesday. However, that becomes the first item after the Address-in-Reply. The Standing Orders provide that the Address-in-Reply has precedence. A motion would have been required to suspend the operation of the Standing Orders for that purpose, so that in this regard the Standing Orders have precedence over the Orders of the House. This means that the Order of the House is implemented and the *Animal Welfare Bill* is the first item after what is required in the Standing Orders. It is in the correct order that it appears on the Notice Paper and we will proceed to the Address-in-Reply.
