Walcott) replied that the Government was defending the actions, "Bourke versus Sullivan" and "Bourke versus Bryan," on the grounds that the actions were unjust: the causes of action having reference to a mistake in the description of the parcels in the grants from the Crown to the plaintiffs, but not in the land itself; and for the reasons that the defendants were very poor, and would, but for the intervention of the Government, have suffered a great wrong, have been reduced to beggary, and thereby become a charge upon the The expenses incurred amounted to £1 15s., but he could not say what further expenses were likely to be incurred.
