### ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS PRIOR TO HEARING

#### Department of Corrective Services

#### Hon Alanna Clohesy asked:

I refer to Page 45 of the Department's 2015-16 Annual Report and the section relating to the Auditor General's Basis for Qualified Opinion, and ask:

- 1) Which specific routine goods and services were not purchased through common use agreements?

Answer: A range of groceries were purchased outside of the relevant Common Use Arrangement, predominately for use in prison canteens.

- 2) What specific purchases were made in which the decision to make those purchases was not justified?

Answer: None of these purchases were not justified.

### ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS PRIOR TO HEARING

#### Department for Corrective Services

#### Hon Stephen Dawson MLC asked:

1. In regards to juvenile justice in 2015-16 I ask:
  - (a) What data transfer occurs between the Department and the Department for Child Protection regarding Children in the Care of the CEO who have come into contact with the justice system?

Answer:

There is no 'data transfer' between the Department of Corrective Services and the Department for Child Protection and Family Support (CPFS) regarding children in the Care of the Chief Executive Officer (CEO).

Exchange of information, to inform collaborative case management of children in the care of the CEO, may be disclosed under sections 23 and 24 of the *Children and Community Services Act 2004*.

- (b) What number and proportion of children admitted to Banksia Hill were from Regional Western Australia?

Answer:

There were 284 distinct young people from regional Western Australia received into Banksia Hill Detention Centre in 2015/16.

This represents 35.4 percent of all distinct young people received during that period.
