

Deputy Premiers of Western Australia

The position of Deputy Premier was first introduced in the Hawke Labour Government in 1955. The first recognised Deputy Premier was John Trezise Tonkin, since then there have been 17 Deputy Premiers in 13 different Governments. The role of the Deputy Premier is to deputise for the Premier when absent or unable to attend an event. The Deputy Premier's position is recognised in the Salaries and Allowances Tribunal determinations.
