1. Meeting of Council

The Council assembled at 2.00pm pursuant to order.

The President, Hon Barry House, took the Chair and read prayers.

2. President's Ruling — Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations — Report No. 37 — Report in relation to a possible contempt regarding summonses to produce documents issued pursuant to Section 5 of the *Parliamentary Privileges Act 1891*

The President ruled as follows —

During proceedings yesterday the Chair of the Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations tabled the Committee's thirty-seventh report in the House. The report advises the House of a possible contempt of the Council by a witness arising from the failure to produce documents pursuant to summons issued by the Committee. Further to my advice to the House yesterday, I have considered the report in the context of Standing Order 92, which deals with matters of privilege. In particular, Standing Order 92(5) provides that, upon a matter of privilege being raised in the House, the President shall determine whether "there is some substance to the matter" and, if so, "refer the matter to the Procedure and Privileges Committee for inquiry and report to the Council".

The question as to whether "some substance" exists in relation to a particular matter requires the President to make a preliminary assessment. This preliminary assessment exists to provide an initial threshold in relation to such matters. As prescribed in Schedule 4 to the Standing Orders, which deals with contempts of the Council, the House has declared that it will not pursue "matters of a trivial nature or unworthy of the attention of the Council". The assessment required of the President under Standing Order 92(5) is whether the relevant matter falls into this category, and therefore should not be considered further. Importantly, Standing Order 92(5) does not require the President to inquire into an alleged contempt beyond that necessary to determine that initial assessment. A thorough inquiry into and assessment of the relevant facts of the matter, and any recommended action for the House, is undertaken by the Standing Committee on Procedure and Privileges.

After reviewing the Estimates and Financial Operations Committee's report, I do not consider the matters raised to be trivial or unworthy of the attention of the Council. Accordingly, I rule that the Committee's report thirty-seven stand referred to the Procedure and Privileges Committee for its inquiry and report to the House.

3. Statement by President — Charles Broadbent — Artwork

The President made the following Statement —

I wish to inform Members that yesterday the Speaker and I joined Mr Charles Broadbent, who comes from Busselton, in unveiling a significant piece of art in the Forrest Foyer. The artistic piece in the shape of a leaf and gumnut incorporates some wood from the lemon-scented gum, which was a prominent feature at the front of Parliament House for many years, together with several other timbers that would have grown naturally on this site in the past. Mr Broadbent has produced an outstanding piece of art that will adorn the walls of Parliament House for many years to come. It reflects an important part of our history and the natural heritage of this site. I wish to record my thanks and congratulations to Mr Charles Broadbent and recommend the artwork to Members and visitors.
