#### The Committee asked:

1) What are some of the implications for your agency from the Commonwealth Budget released on May 2018?

#### **Answer**

The Commonwealth Budget allocated additional funding for capital upgrades for facilities under the National Collaborative Research Infrastructure Strategy. This funding will support national research infrastructure and ensure the maintenance of data streams through equipment upgrades and utilisation of the latest technologies. This includes infrastructure under the Terrestrial Ecosystem Research Network that supports the surveillance monitoring network for improved monitoring and assessment of Australia's rangelands, including the Supersite Flux tower at Credo, a former pastoral lease managed by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions, and the establishment and sampling of national surveillance monitoring sites. Currently there are 105 such sites established in Western Australia. The capital funding will also support maintenance of the Atlas of Living Australia that collates Australia's biodiversity data, including data contributed through the Department's NatureMap and Florabase databases.

#### Hon Diane Evers MLC asked:

1) I refer to the last point on page 570 of Budget paper 2 v2:

Please provide a breakdown of the number of visits to each marine and terrestrial park that the agency managed in 2016-17?

#### Answer

The Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions manages several hundred marine and terrestrial parks and reserves in addition to State forest and other lands. The total area exceeds 28,500,000 ha.

Visitor use was monitored at 446 sites in 2016-17 utilising a variety of methods including traffic classifiers and counters, pedestrian counters, observation surveys, and ticket sales in national parks, State forest and other reserves throughout the State managed by the Parks and Wildlife Service. Below is a breakdown of visitation to each Parks and Wildlife Service region.

## Hon Diane Evers MLC asked:

- 2) I refer to the last point on page 571 of Budget Paper 2, Volume 2;
  - a) Can you please advise what adaptive management strategies in relation to climate change have been implemented;
  - b) With reference to (a) what has been the result; and
  - c) Can you please advise what additional strategies the Department will be implementing in future?

#### Answer

- a) The Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) implements a range of adaptive management strategies addressing the threat of climate change. For example, a means to mitigating the threat of climate change is the expansion of the conservation reserve system, which provides options to enable species to utilise and adapt to larger more integrated protected areas. The Government is committed to creating the Fitzroy River National Park, a marine and national park over the Buccaneer Archipelago and expansion of the Wellington National Park. It will also establish and manage two new regional parks in Bunbury the Preston River to Ocean Regional Park and the Leschenault Regional Park. Additionally, prescribed burning is mitigating the threat of major bushfires and weed control and dieback management maintain the resilience of our parks and forests.
- b) The result has been an expanding conservation estate, a strong record of prescribed burning since this Government was elected, and weed and dieback management prioritised to high conservation value assets.
- c) Into the future, DBCA will create the Fitzroy River National Park, a marine and national park over the Buccaneer Archipelago and expand the Wellington National Park. It will also establish and manage two new regional parks in Bunbury the Preston River to Ocean Regional Park and the Leschenault Regional Park.

- I refer to the statement found in Budget Paper 2, Volume 2, Page 570: "As part of joint management arrangements with Traditional Owners at Murujuga National Park on the Burrup Peninsula, the Department will assist in the development of a Living Knowledge Centre and park infrastructure in collaboration with Woodside and Rio Tinto. Consultation is being undertaken with the Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation to consider the nomination of the Burrup Peninsula for World Heritage listing." And ask:
  - a) Has the Premier committed to pursuing the nomination of the Burrup Peninsula for World Heritage Listing?
  - b) If yes to (a) on what date did he make this commitment?
  - c) If no to (a) why not?
  - d) Has Peter Jeffries the CEO of the Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation issued a statement saying that the Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation wanted to pursue World Heritage listing?
  - e) If yes to (d) on what date did he make this commitment?
  - f) Has the Commonwealth Government formally requested the views of the WA State Government to some or all of the Dampier Archipelago and the Burrup (Murujuga) Non-Industrial Land being nominated to the World Heritage List?
  - g) If yes to (f) when did this occur?
  - h) Given that the State Government and the Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation are committed to World Heritage why is the State Government now embarking on a process of only considering the nomination of the Burrup Peninsula for World Heritage Listing?

has advised that it will write to the State to request that World Heritage listing be progressed if its members and the Circle of Elders support the listing. The State is yet to receive this formal request.

  - d) With the increased output of CO2e emanating from an expanding LNG sector, what is the current estimated level of annual CO2e emissions in WA for the last year of data, and please include the year;
  - e) If there is an estimate of CO2e emissions in WA for the last year of data will the Department table the report/s that establishes this data; and
  - f) If no answer is provided for (d) or (e) please explain why?
