Question No C2 Hon Peter Katsambanis MLC asked -

Do you offer a rebate scheme to householders who perhaps have a leak if it is discovered that they have one. Provide the total subsidy of that and the number of premises impacted?

Answer:

The Water Corporation provides financial assistance to customers who have received a high water use bill as a result of an internal leak that was not visible (usually underground). The allowances granted to customers are funded by an Operating Subsidy.

7,442 properties were granted leak allowances in 2013/14. The subsidy for these allowances was \$4,761,305.
