### Chair's Foreword

t is a considerable honour to have been appointed Chair of the Legislative
Assembly's Economics and Industry Standing Committee for the 40th Parliament,
and a pleasure to present its first Annual Report.

The 2016-17 year was an unusual one for the Parliament insofar as it was punctuated by a State General Election. This Report therefore covers the activities of both the 39<sup>th</sup> and 40<sup>th</sup> Parliaments' Economics and Industry Standing Committees.

I would like to recognise the work of the 39<sup>th</sup> Parliament's EISC members: Chair, Mr Ian Blayney MLA; Deputy Chair, Hon Fran Logan MLA and members Mr Jan Norberger MLA, Mr Peter Tinley AM MLA and Hon Terry Waldron MLA. Particular acknowledgement should also go to the Committee Secretariat of Dr Loraine Abernethie and Mr Michael Burton.

Amongst their achievements listed in this Report, the 39<sup>th</sup> Parliament's Committee presented report No. 9, *Growing WA through Innovation: The Western Australian Government's role in fostering innovation to expand and diversify the economy*, which identified a range of opportunities to broaden the State's economic base. This Report is a substantial contribution to public debate on how governments can support and encourage entrepreneurism and growth throughout the State.

The 40<sup>th</sup> Parliament's EISC was established on 17 May 2017 and has a remarkably broad range of portfolios within its remit.

In our early deliberations, EISC members have all expressed a desire to meaningfully contribute to the Parliament's work in support of the industries and jobs of the future. I would like to thank Deputy Chair Mr Sean L'Estrange MLA and members Mr Yaz Mubarakai MLA, Mr Stephen Price MLA and Hon Terry Redman MLA for their constructive engagement on the development of the Committee's agenda. We have an interesting year ahead and look forward to the ongoing support of Principal Research Officer, Dr David Worth, and Research Officer, Mr Lachlan Gregory.

The Committee began its work by considering the effectiveness of protections afforded to subcontractors working on Government projects and received a briefing from the Department of Finance.

Recognising the importance of aviation to state development, the Committee then initiated its first inquiry, examining the impact that high airfares have on regional Western Australia. The Committee will consider the effects on communities, businesses and tourism; examine the factors contributing to high airfares; and make a series of recommendations on actions that the State Government and industry might take to

place downward pressure on prices. We have received a high number of submissions and had considerable interest in the Committee's hearings schedule, reflecting the level of community and industry concern regarding this issue.

There can be no doubt that Western Australia faces a range of significant economic challenges – it is vital that we turn our minds to the opportunities of the future and work to address impediments to growth. Parliamentary Committees perform important work in Westminster systems. They can encourage in-depth, considered inquiry into matters of public importance and promote constructive, bipartisan approaches to complex policy issues. In this spirit, I thank my colleagues for their collaborative engagement thus far and look forward to the coming year.

# **Chapter 1**

## Committee's activities

#### Introduction

The 2016-17 reporting period encompasses two parliamentary sessions. The 39<sup>th</sup> Parliament was prorogued and dissolved by the Governor on 30 January 2017. This dissolution terminated the Parliament and its committees. The Economics and Industry Standing Committee ('the Committee') of the 40<sup>th</sup> Parliament was established on 23 May 2017.

A summary of the activities of the Committee during the course of this reporting period – 1 July 2016 to 30 June 2017 – is included in Table 1.1.

#### **Conferences and visits**

During the period 2016-17 in both the 39<sup>th</sup> and 40<sup>th</sup> Parliaments, the Committee did not attend any conferences.

The Committee of the 39<sup>th</sup> Parliament held a public forum on 17 August 2016 at Technology Park Bentley so that Members could speak to Report No. 9, *Growing WA through Innovation: The Western Australian Government's role in fostering innovation to expand and diversify the economy.* More importantly, it used the forum to explain the Report's findings and the practical nature of the recommendations, and provide an opportunity for those who had participated in the inquiry to ask questions and make comments on the Report.

On 16 November 2016 the Committee undertook a site visit to the headquarters of the Department of Agriculture and Food, Western Australia, in South Perth.

#### **Investigative travel**

During the period 2016-17 in both the 39<sup>th</sup> and 40<sup>th</sup> Parliaments, the Committee did not undertake any investigative travel.

#### Work in progress

On the 14 June 2017, the Committee advised the Parliament that it had resolved to inquire into and report on matters relating to airfare prices on regular public transport (RPT) air routes in regional Western Australia. In particular, the Committee will evaluate the:

- a. factors contributing to the current high cost of regional airfares;
- b. impacts that high-cost regional airfares have on regional centres from a business, tourism and social perspective;
- c. impact of State Government regulatory processes on the cost and efficiency of regional air services;
- actions that the State and local government authorities can take to limit increases to airfares without undermining the commercial viability of RPT services;
- e. actions that airlines can take to limit increases to airfares without undermining the commercial viability of RPT services; and
- f. recent actions taken by other Australian governments to limit regional RPT airfare increases.

The Committee will report to the House by 28 November 2017.

# **Chapter 2**

## **Financial statement**

**Expenditure of the Committee during the financial year.** 

#### **Committee expenditure**

The Committee does not have its own formal budget and is funded out of the budget of the Legislative Assembly. Approval for major expenditure is required on a case-by-case basis and is subject to the approval of the Speaker.

The Committee is required, in accordance with Standing Order 276, to detail expenditure for the financial year 1 July 2016-30 June 2017. The Legislative Assembly dissolved on 30 January 2017 prior to the State election; therefore two Committees operated during the 2016-17 financial year. The figures tendered below cover the full reporting period and therefore also include expenditure by the Committee of the  $39^{th}$  Parliament.

## **Appendix One**

#### Committee's functions and powers

The functions of the Committee are to review and report to the Assembly on: -

- a) the outcomes and administration of the departments within the Committee's portfolio responsibilities;
- b) annual reports of Government departments laid on the Table of the House;
- c) the adequacy of legislation and regulations within its jurisdiction; and
- d) any matters referred to it by the Assembly including a Bill, motion, petition, vote or expenditure, other financial matter, report or paper.

At the commencement of each Parliament and as often thereafter as the Speaker considers necessary, the Speaker will determine and table a schedule showing the portfolio responsibilities for each committee. Annual reports of Government departments and authorities tabled in the Assembly will stand referred to the relevant Committee for any inquiry the Committee may make.

Whenever a Committee receives or determines for itself fresh or amended terms of reference, the Committee will forward them to each Standing and Select committee of the Assembly and Joint Committee of the Assembly and Council. The Speaker will announce them to the Assembly at the next opportunity and arrange for them to be placed on the notice boards of the Assembly.
