3. Statement by President - Legislative Council - Better Practice Agency

The Deputy President reported the receipt of Message No. 148 from the Legislative Assembly forwarding the Bill for concurrence.

The Minister for Transport on behalf of the Leader of the House representing the Premier moved, That the Bill be now read a first time.

Question - put and passed.

Bill read a first time.

The Minister for Transport on behalf of the Leader of the House representing the Premier moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Point of Order

Hon Sue Ellery raised the following Point of Order -

Members would be aware that Standing Order 230A applies to a bill that ratifies or gives effect to bilateral or multilateral intergovernmental agreements to which the Government of the state is a party, and automatically refers that bill to the Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review. There are two questions I might have put to you now, Mr Deputy President. The first one is to seek from you your view about whether or not this bill should stand referred under Standing Order 230A. If, Mr Deputy President, you were of a view to rely on an earlier ruling, which has been drawn to my attention, in respect of the *Mutual Recognition (Western Australia) Bill 2001*, that ruling provides, if I may read it out —

Standing Order No. 230(c) refers to the automatic referral of a Bill to what was the old Constitutional Affairs Committee, but is now the Legislation Committee, on the basis that a Bill ratifies or gives effect to a bilateral or multilateral intergovernmental agreement or, by reason of its subject matter, introduces a uniform scheme or uniform laws.

This the critical bit I think, Mr President —

This is a not a Bill that is affected by Standing Order No. 230(c) on the basis that it is a continuation of a uniform scheme that has already had effect in Western Australia and been given legislative effect.

Mr President, my second part of my point of order is that if that is the ruling that you would rely on, how is the House to be satisfied that there is in fact nothing different from the bill that was captured by that clause of the previous ruling—that is, "it is a continuation of the uniform scheme that has already had effect in Western Australia and been given legislative effect"? After having listened to the second reading speech, I will stand corrected, but I thought I heard the Minister say something about the Commonwealth Act having been amended once, earlier this year, to add a South Australian provision to the list of permanent exemptions in Schedule 2. The second part of the question in my point of order is: is the President satisfied that there is no difference between the uniform scheme that has already been given legislative effect in Western Australia and the uniform scheme that is before the House now?

President's Ruling

The President ruled as follows -

Members, the Leader of the Opposition has asked for some clarification. As it stands, we had anticipated the question being asked on this bill and the points raised by the Leader of the Opposition. Therefore, some comments in respect of a ruling have been prepared in anticipation of the Leader of the Opposition raising that very point. I will now read the ruling.

Standing Order 230A relates to the automatic referral of a bill to the Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review on the basis that the bill ratifies or gives effect to a bilateral or multilateral intergovernmental agreement or, by reason of its subject matter, introduces a uniform scheme or uniform laws. This is not a bill that is affected by Standing Order 230A. The bill will merely enable the continuation of a uniform scheme developed in the 1990s that has already had longstanding legislative effect in Western Australia. The bill will effectively replace and continue the role of existing legislation that is due to expire at the end of February 2011. The bill is a relatively short bill and there are no significant changes proposed in the bill from the existing *Mutual Recognition (Western Australia) Act 2001*. Similarly, the Commonwealth Act that is proposed to be continued be adopted in Western Australia by the bill, the Commonwealth *Mutual Recognition Act 1992*, has not been the subject of any significant amendment since its last adoption in 2001.

Both the bill and the adopted Commonwealth legislation are, in their nature, basic legislation that provides an overarching framework ensuring that trade in goods and the conduct of an occupation are to be facilitated and mutually recognised throughout Australia. The specific regulation of inter-jurisdictional trade and the recognition of professional qualifications are

dealt with in separate legislation arising from various intergovernmental agreements. These specific intergovernmental agreements and their implementing legislation are each subject to Standing Order 230A as the relevant bills come before the House. Accordingly, this is not a bill that stands referred under Standing Order 230A. I note that a ruling in similar terms was give in relation to the 2001 equivalent of this bill on 12 June 2001.

Point of Order

Hon Sue Ellery raised the following Point of Order -

With the greatest of respect, Mr President, obviously I have not seen that ruling, so I am relying on what I have just heard you say. In the previous ruling that was relied on, it seemed to me that the key sentence was the sentence that read —

This is a not a Bill that is affected by — The relevant Standing Order — on the basis that it is a continuation of a uniform scheme that has already had effect in Western Australia and been given legislative effect.

In the ruling you have just given us, Mr President, you have referred to the fact that some assessment has been made that no significant changes are made to that uniform scheme. The previous ruling in 2001 offered no qualification. It stated that the bill did not need to be referred to the Legislation Committee because it was a continuation—not because it was a continuation with just some slight changes, but, without qualification, because it was a continuation.

I do not mean any disrespect or to dissent from your ruling at all, but can you satisfy the House that you are satisfied, Mr President, that there are indeed no significant changes? The second reading speech has just been read in, so I have no way of satisfying myself, other than relying on your advice to me, that the change between the ruling in 2001, which offered no qualification, and your ruling now, which states that there are no significant changes, is that it is just a continuation. I wonder whether you might be able to assist me by perhaps illuminating how you were satisfied about that.

President's Ruling

The President ruled as follows -

Leader of the Opposition, Members, I will take that comment on notice and come back first thing tomorrow morning to clarify that extra point that you see in the legislation that needs further clarification.

Debate stands adjourned.
