MOTIONS

1. Elimination of Gas in Residential Buildings (*Notice given 11 August 2022*)

Hon Dr Brad Pettitt: To move —

That this House calls on the McGowan Government to:

- (a) bring forward legislation that will end gas connections in all new residential buildings as soon as possible;
- (b) create and fund a plan to eliminate gas from houses entirely; and
- (c) develop and fund a range of incentives that will help households and businesses change over from gas to renewable, electric houses.

2. State's Energy System (*Notice given 16 November 2022*)

Hon Dr Steve Thomas: To move —

That this House notes —

- (a) the risk of power outages in the State's energy system over this and future summers;
- (b) the Government's admission that it will likely need to import coal to Collie to generate electricity;
- (c) the Government's plan for energy transition announced in a media release on 14 June 2022 which highlights —
 - (i) the inability of the Government to detail how the proposed new energy system would maintain baseload energy;

- (ii) the inability of the Government to detail how the proposed new system would provide adequate storage of energy, and
- (iii) the hopes of the Government that the private sector will somehow come up with solutions to all these issues in the next few years,

and calls on the Government to deliver a fully detailed and costed plan for energy transition without unknowns and guesswork.

3. Fines Enforcement Regime (*Notice given 24 November 2022*)

Hon Pierre Yang: To move —

That this House notes the historic reform of Western Australia's fines enforcement regime during the last term of Government and commends the McGowan Government on the meaningful difference this reform has provided to those in our community who experience genuine hardship as a result of their inability to pay a fine. In particular, this House notes in relation to the reform —

- (a) the impact of the commencement of the work and development permit scheme;
- (b) the reduction in the number of individuals imprisoned as a result of fine defaulting;
- (c) the introduction of garnishee orders and their impact in recovering payment for outstanding fines; and
- (d) the prohibition of issuing licence suspension orders for individuals whose last known address is in a remote area, addressing the disproportionate impact of suspended licences on individuals living in remote areas without public transport infrastructure.

4. Attorney General (*Notice given 30 November 2022*)

Hon Nick Goiran: To move —

That this House —

- (a) expresses its concerns that the Attorney General has once again broken the law of our State;
- (b) notes that —
 - (i) since 7 April 2022, the Attorney General has been knowingly in breach of section 110ZZE of the *Guardianship and Administration Act 1990*; and
 - (ii) on a date between 7 April 2022 and 29 November 2022, the Attorney General wilfully breached that same section of the Act;
- (c) further notes that the Attorney General continues to knowingly and wilfully breach this law of our State; and
- (d) calls on the Premier to replace the Attorney General with a reliable Member who will not be confused about their duty to abide by the rule of law, not merely at their own convenience, but at all times.

5. Elder Abuse (*Notice given 16 February 2023*)

Hon Nick Goiran: To move —

That this House —

- (a) reminds the McGowan Labor Government that its January 2017 election manifesto on responding to elder abuse promised that it would “expedite” amendments to the law surrounding enduring powers of attorney and guardianship;
- (b) notes that on 13 September 2017 the Legislative Council established, on the motion of the Opposition, the Select Committee into Elder Abuse;
- (c) reminds the Government that the Select Committee’s 24th recommendation in its 2018 Final Report called on it to “act as a matter of urgency”;
- (d) notes that more than 6 years have passed since the election promise was made;
- (e) expresses its deep concern about the impact on victims of elder abuse given its prevalence in our State and reports of an increase during the pandemic; and
- (f) calls on the Government to apologise for breaking trust with the victims, the electors and the Parliament, and to make amends without any further delay.

6. METRONET (*Notice given 21 February 2023*)

Hon Tjorn Sibma: To move —

That this House —

- (a) note the extraordinary 300 per cent growth in capital expenditure allocated to the now \$10 billion METRONET program in a heated construction market;
- (b) calls upon the McGowan Government to accept responsibility for METRONET’s litany of project delays and missed timelines;
- (c) criticise the McGowan Government’s determination to prioritise expenditure on METRONET above other key community metropolitan and regional infrastructure needs; and
- (d) admonish the McGowan Government for its reluctance to openly admit the budgetary pressure METRONET’s operating costs will place on future governments and their capacity to meet the needs of the Western Australian community.

7. Parliamentary Budget Office (*Notice given 23 February 2023*)

Hon Wilson Tucker: To move —

That consistent with the recommendations of Report 82 of the Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations, the Legislative Council calls on the Government to establish a Parliamentary Budget Office.

8. Climate Change (*Notice given 14 March 2023*)

Hon Shelley Payne: To move —

That the Legislative Council —

- (a) recognise that climate change has a profound and detrimental impact on the availability of water resources in Western Australia, particularly in the south-west of Western Australia and the Perth metropolitan region; and
- (b) commend the McGowan Labor Government for its leadership in developing policies and initiatives to address these climate change impacts on our precious water resources.

9. Government Trading Enterprises (*Notice given 21 March 2023*)

Hon Dr Steve Thomas: To move —

That this House —

- (a) notes the Government's inability to provide proper oversight and transparency in relation to Government trading enterprises;
- (b) notes section 6 of the *Gold Corporation Act 1987* that allows the Minister to request any information from Gold Corporation under section 6(9) and that Gold Corporation must comply with that request under section 6(10);
- (c) notes that section 6(7) of the Act states that "*Gold Corporation shall furnish to the Minister all information in the possession of Gold Corporation relating to the business of Gold Corporation*" for Parliamentary purposes, which according to the Act in section 6(11) includes the answering of questions and "*complying with a written law, or an order or resolution of a House of Parliament, that requires information to be furnished to a House of Parliament*"; and
- (d) calls on the Minister for Mines and Petroleum to have tabled in the Legislative Council the minutes of the Gold Corporation's meetings in 2021, 2022 and 2023.

10. Investing in Sport (*Notice given 29 March 2023*)

Hon Stephen Pratt: To move —

That the Legislative Council —

- (a) acknowledges the importance of female participation in sport ahead of the FIFA Women's World Cup; and
- (b) recognises the investment by the McGowan Government into the new State Football Centre, along with other sporting facilities across the State.

11. Plastic Waste in Western Australia (*Notice given 29 March 2023*)

Hon Dr Sally Talbot: To move —

That the Legislative Council commends the McGowan Labor Government's ongoing commitment to innovation and leadership in management of plastics including the strategic reduction, reuse, and management of plastic waste in Western Australia.

12. Indigenous Voice to Parliament (*Notice given 16 May 2023*)

Hon Rosetta Sahanna: To move —

That the Legislative Council supports the proposal to recognise the First Peoples of Australia in the Constitution and establish an Indigenous Voice to Parliament.

13. Implementation of the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act regulations (*Notice given 15 June 2023*)

Hon Neil Thomson: To move —

That this House —

- (a) shares the extraordinary level of concern expressed by the community about how unprepared the State is in the implementation of the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act regulations with a record number of signatures received on an electronic petition in a very short time frame;
- (b) notes the expression of anxiety and concern of landowners and small and medium businesses sector, including pastoralists and graziers, farmers and any contractors or individuals who might need to carry out ground disturbing activity after 1 July 2023 regarding their ability to comply with the new regulations;
- (c) notes the deep concern that the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage's Permit System will only be operational on 1 July, meaning applicants will need to cease work while they wait for approvals to be processed after 1 July 2023;
- (d) notes the concern that no Local Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Services (LACHS) are yet registered and the associated concerns expressed by traditional owners about implementation of the new laws and challenges establishing LACHS;
- (e) notes that many in the community, including landowners in the metropolitan area, have not been aware of the changes and their obligations under the new Act and this cohort are only now just becoming aware of how the new laws might impact on them; and
- (f) calls on the Cook Government to delay the promulgation of the regulations by at least six months to alleviate anxiety in the community, reduce the risk of business disruption, establish functioning and tested systems, ensure LACHS are properly resourced and functioning, and provide better advice to all parties that are affected, including residential land owners who have blocks greater than 1,100m².

- (2) The Select Committee is to inquire into and report on —
 - (a) the role of child development services on a child's overall development, health and wellbeing;
 - (b) the delivery of child development services in both metropolitan and regional Western Australia, including paediatric and allied health services;
 - (c) the role of specialist medical colleges, universities and other training bodies in establishing sufficient workforce pathways;
 - (d) opportunities to increase engagement in the primary care sector including improved collaboration across both government and non-government child development services including Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations; and
 - (e) other government child development service models and programs operating outside of Western Australia and the applicability of those programs to the State.
- (3) The Select Committee is to report no later than 12 months after the motion is agreed to.

- (4) The Select Committee shall consist of three members: Hon Dr Sally Talbot (Chair); Hon Donna Faragher; and Hon Samantha Rowe.

1. **Standing Committee on Estimates and Financial Operations — Terms of Reference: Inquiry into the financial administration of homelessness services in Western Australia** (*Notice given 18 November 2021*)

Resolution of the Committee on 17 November 2021 to commence an Inquiry into the financial administration of homelessness services in Western Australia with particular focus on —

- (a) the current funding and delivery of services;
- (b) 'All Paths Lead to a Home', Western Australia's 10-Year Strategy on Homelessness 2020-2030;
- (c) existing data systems and how data informs service delivery; and
- (d) any other related matter.

2. **Joint Standing Committee on the Corruption and Crime Commission — Terms of Reference: Inquiry into What happens next? Beyond a finding of serious misconduct** (*Notice given 24 March 2022*)

Resolution of the Committee on 23 March 2022 to commence an inquiry entitled *What happens next? Beyond a finding of serious misconduct* with the following terms of reference —

The Committee will inquire into what happens after a public officer is found to have engaged in serious misconduct including —

- (a) disciplinary and other sanctions imposed by departments, local government, the Western;
- (b) unexplained wealth and criminal benefits proceedings initiated by the Corruption and Crime Commission;
- (c) criminal prosecutions arising from serious misconduct investigations including prosecuting arrangements, challenges and outcomes;
- (d) the roles of the Corruption and Crime Commission, Public Sector Commission, departments, local government, the Western Australia Police Force and other authorities in taking action, overseeing and/or reporting the above outcomes; and
- (e) measures to improve the effectiveness, transparency and/or oversight of the above.

The Committee will report by 30 November 2023.

3. Joint Standing Committee on the Commissioner for Children and Young People — Terms of Reference: Inquiry into the most effective ways for Western Australia to address food insecurity for children and young people affected by poverty (*Notice given 7 April 2022*)

Resolution of the Committee on 6 April 2022 to commence an inquiry into the most effective ways for Western Australia to address food insecurity for children and young people affected by poverty with the following terms of reference —

The Committee will consider —

- (1) The impact of poor nutrition on children and young people and the extent of the problem in Western Australia.
- (2) Challenges for children and young people in accessing enough nutritious food.
- (3) The extent to which food relief:
 - (a) is currently accessed by children and young people, including at school and in early childhood education and care settings; and
 - (b) is effective.
- (4) The extent to which food literacy programs aimed at children and young people and/or their parents/carers:
 - (a) are currently accessed; and
 - (b) are effective
- (5) Government-funded school lunch programs.
- (6) Any other existing or potential initiatives.
- (7) Western Australia's obligations and responsibilities to monitor and address food insecurity as an aspect of child wellbeing.

The Committee is particularly keen to hear about experiences of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and the children of refugees and newly arrived migrants.

The Committee will report by 30 April 2023.

Extension of reporting date to 30 June 2023 (Wednesday, 16 November 2022).

4. Standing Committee on Public Administration — Report No. 39 — Terms of Reference: Inquiry into organ and tissue donation in Western Australia (*Notice given 14 February 2023*)

Resolution of the Committee on 13 February 2023 to commence an Inquiry into organ and tissue donation in Western Australia. The Committee will inquire into and report on —

- (a) the effectiveness of the current model for organ and tissue donation in Western Australia;
- (b) issues impacting organ and tissue donation rates in Western Australia;
- (c) opportunities to improve organ and tissue donation rates in Western Australia; and
- (d) any other matters considered relevant by the Committee.

5. Standing Committee on Environment and Public Affairs — Report 61 — Terms of Reference: Inquiry into past forced adoptive policies and practices (*Notice given 22 February 2023*)

Resolution of the Committee on 22 February 2023 to commence an Inquiry into the past adoptive policies and practices of the twentieth century, notably the years between 1939 and 1980. In particular, the Committee will seek to —

- (1) understand the lived experiences of those affected by historical forced adoption practices
- (2) examine the role of the State Government, health services and private institutions in these practices
- (3) identify what measures are currently available to assist persons experiencing distress, their effectiveness, and how those persons may be supported further
- (4) consider any other matter that arises during the course of the inquiry deemed to be relevant by the Committee.
