MOTIONS

1. E-Petitions — Disparaging Remarks of the Premier *(Notice given 21 June 2023)*

Hon Nick Goiran: To move —

That this House —

- (a) expresses its concern with the disparaging remarks of the Premier on 20 June 2023 regarding official parliamentary petitions hosted on the portal established through the Parliament of Western Australia's website;
- (b) has considered and had particular regard for the recommendations contained in a number of reports from the Standing Committee on Procedure and Privileges in the period 2016 to 2023, which were the genesis to the establishment of official parliamentary e-petitions:
 - (i) Report 40, E-Petitions, 28 June 2016;
 - (ii) Report 45, Outstanding Matters from the 39th Parliament, 24 August 2017; and
 - (iii) Report 64, Review of the Standing Orders, 2 September 2021;
- (c) thanks the Members and staff of the Standing Committee for their subsequent review of e-petitions which manifested in Report 69 being tabled in February 2023;
- (d) notes the Standing Committee was satisfied that the process was operating effectively;
- (e) acknowledges and affirms the right to petition;

- (f) encourages the Premier to familiarise himself with that right, which was established in 1215 under the *Magna Carta*;
- (g) further encourages the Premier to read Article 5 of the *Bill of Rights 1689* which reaffirmed that right;
- (h) recommends that the Premier obtain a briefing from the Attorney General or the Solicitor General to ensure he is clear on this right held by all Western Australians; and
- (i) calls on the Premier to listen to the grievances and requests of Western Australian petitioners and desist from treating those concerns with disdain.

2. Fishing Industry — Government Compensation (*Notice given 18 October 2023*)

Hon Colin de Grussa: To move —

That the Legislative Council —

- (a) acknowledges the invaluable economic and social contribution of the fishing industry to our State;
- (b) recognises the impacts of government processes in establishing marine reserves and managing fishing industries with regard to —
 - (i) the potential effects on the future viability of Western Australia's world class commercial and tourism fishing industries; and
 - (ii) the potential impacts on food security and tourism due to the sourcing of fish products from international markets; and
- (c) urges the Government to commit to enhancing statutory and compensatory mechanisms to provide fair and timely compensation to operators affected by Government actions.

3. Armadale Line Shutdown (*Notice given 14 November 2023*)

Hon Tjorn Sibma: To move —

That this House notes —

- (a) the Minister for Transport's decision to shut down the Armadale line for at least 18 months from 20 November 2023;
- (b) the cost and inconvenience of this decision which further exacerbates the financial costs of the METRONET project;
- (c) the hallmark secrecy which surrounded this decision and the ensuing inadequate consultation with passengers;
- (d) the Minister's failure to provide any compelling evidence that this shutdown is the best solution to facilitate the METRONET program of works; and
- (e) the absence of any plan to mitigate the potential for the shutdown extending beyond 18 months, and the impacts this will have on many commuters across the metropolitan area.

4. Responsible Exercise of the Corruption and Crime Commission's Powers (*Notice given 29 November 2023*)

Hon Nick Goiran: To move —

That this House —

- (a) notes with appreciation the Parliamentary Inspector of the Corruption and Crime Commission's report of 27 November 2023 correcting the errors and omissions contained in the Corruption and Crime Commission's (CCC) report of 12 March 2019;

- (b) endorses the Parliamentary Inspector's conclusion that it is not a responsible exercise of the CCC's powers to report to Parliament speculating that a person has 'possibly' committed an offence in a situation where it does not know whether a person has committed a criminal offence, and where it has not conducted sufficient research to determine the matter;
- (c) notes with concern the CCC's refusal to prepare a supplementary report to address the errors and omissions;
- (d) thanks Parliamentary Inspector Matthew Zilko SC for his continued service as a monitor on the operation of the *Corruption, Crime and Misconduct Act 2003*;
- (e) expresses its appreciation to the members and staff responsible for the drafting, tabling and publishing of Report 61 of the *Standing Committee on Procedure and Privileges*;
- (f) notes that the Committee's audit revealed that 1,120 privileged documents were provided without parliamentary approval by the Government to the CCC;
- (g) reasserts that draft parliamentary speeches, motions and questions are subject to parliamentary privilege in the same way as confidential parliamentary committee material such as committee deliberations and draft report recommendations; and
- (h) reminds the CCC that the legislature has entrusted it with extraordinary powers and that its immunity from defamation actions and other claims for damages highlight why those powers must be exercised with caution and prudence.

5. **Bicentennial Anniversary Celebrations** (*Notice given 27 February 2024*)

Hon Tjorn Sibma: To move —

That this House —

- (a) acknowledge the year 2029 will mark the bicentennial anniversary of the foundation of Perth and Fremantle, and the establishment of the Swan River Colony;
- (b) additionally, acknowledge that 2026 will mark the bicentennial anniversary of the establishment of a British presence at Albany;
- (c) that these historic moments set the trajectory for the development of modern Western Australia, subsequently forming part of the Commonwealth of Australia;
- (d) that the commemoration and celebration of these milestones provides an opportunity for all Western Australians, of all backgrounds, both to reflect upon the achievements of our State, and upon our shared aspirations as a unified and cohesive community looking to the next two centuries; and
- (e) that the State Government support a bipartisan approach which funds and coordinates an appropriate program of works and events to mark the bicentenaries in a manner which involves and respects the contributions of all Western Australians.

6. Elder Abuse (*Notice given 27 February 2024*)

Hon Nick Goiran: To move —

That this House —

- (a) reminds the WA Labor Government that its January 2017 election manifesto on responding to elder abuse promised that it would “expedite” amendments to the law surrounding enduring powers of attorney and guardianship;
- (b) notes that on 13 September 2017 the Legislative Council established, on the motion of the Opposition, the Select Committee into Elder Abuse;
- (c) reminds the Government that the Select Committee’s 24th recommendation in its 2018 Final Report called on it to “act as a matter of urgency”;
- (d) notes that more than 7 years have passed since the election promise was made;
- (e) expresses its deep concern about the impact on victims of elder abuse given its prevalence in our State; and
- (f) calls on the Government to apologise for breaking trust with the victims, the electors and the Parliament, and to make amends without any further delay.

7. Home Ownership (*Notice given 27 February 2024*)

Hon Tjorn Sibma: To move —

That this House —

- (a) commits to the desirability of home ownership as a critical policy objective for any responsible Government;
- (b) that home ownership must remain a plausible and achievable goal for people – so that an individual earning a median income should realistically be capable of purchasing a median-priced dwelling over the long run of economic and property price cycles;
- (c) acknowledge the many forms and sources of policy challenges and impediments to home ownership facing the community of Western Australia; and
- (d) note with alarm that these challenges and impediments to home ownership are disproportionately impacting younger people.

8. Transport and METRONET (*Notice given 21 March 2024*)

Hon Klara Andric: To move —

That the Legislative Council commends the Cook Government’s investment in transport and METRONET, including the State’s first locally built and manufactured C-series train entering service.

9. Select Committee into METRONET Contracts (*Notice given 16 April 2024*)

Hon Dr Brian Walker: To move —

- (1) A select committee to be known as the Select Committee into METRONET Contracts is established.
- (2) The Select Committee is to inquire into and report on the issuing and appropriate monitoring of METRONET contracts since the 2017 formation of the METRONET multi-agency team, with particular reference to —

- (a) due diligence having been undertaken by the Government to ensure that companies in receipt of contracts were legally able to fulfil the terms of those contracts at the time they were granted; and
 - (b) that all such companies have, since the granting of such contracts, operated in compliance with all relevant State and Federal employment laws.
- (3) The Select Committee shall consist of five members, including Hon Dr Brian Walker who is appointed Chair.
- (4) The Select Committee is to report by 28 November 2024.

10. Fire and Emergency Service Workers and Volunteers (*Notice given 14 May 2024*)

Hon Martin Aldridge: To move —

That this House —

- (a) notes the impact that trauma has on our frontline fire and emergency service workers and volunteers;
- (b) notes that the State Government has extended PTSD presumptive protections to ambulance and fire and emergency service workers;
- (c) notes that the State Government has committed to acting similarly with respect to Police Officers; and
- (d) calls upon the State Government to ensure that Western Australia's 30,000 fire and emergency service volunteers including ambulance volunteers have comparable protections to those in paid employment, undertaking the same functions.

11. Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (*Notice given 30 May 2024*)

Hon Shelley Payne: To move —

That this House commends the Cook Labor Government for its investment in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) in our schools, including an increased focus on encouraging more women into STEM related careers.
