1. Meeting of Council

Hon Giz Watson presented a petition, by delivery to the Clerk, [SO 130], from 10 residents of Western Australia requesting the Legislative Council to support the protection of mature trees on public land in urban areas. (Tabled paper 2235).

Hon Barbara Scott presented a petition from 550 residents of Western Australia requesting the Legislative Council to recommend increased accommodation support services in Western Australia enabling the provision of a group home for people with disabilities. (Tabled paper 2236).

Page 2, after line 22 — To insert —

"Coordinator of Energy" means the person referred to in section 4 of the *Energy Coordination Act 1994*.

Clause 5

Page 4, after line 5 — To insert —

(c) the elector will be required to identify demographic information including

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- (i) age;
- (ii) sex;
- (iii) whether they have children of school age;
- (iv) postcode; and
- (v) occupation.

New Clause 5

Page 3, after line 14 — To insert the following new clause —

"

5. Report on impact of daylight saving on electricity use

The Coordinator of Energy shall, by 1 May 2007, prepare and publish a report on the impact of the trial period of daylight saving on electricity use in Western Australia.

"

 - (ii) sex;
 - (iii) whether he or she has children of school age;
 - (iv) postcode; and
 - (v) occupation.

Rather than go into the discussion, I would like you to let me know whether it is possible to move that amendment.

Chairman's Ruling

The Chairman ruled as follows -

Hon Helen Morton has asked for my ruling on whether her proposed amendment is valid. The amendment deals with the elector being required to identify certain demographic information, and then lists the type of information that is required. The issue at hand is whether the amendment is within the scope and purpose of the Bill. The long title of the Bill states, in part -

A Bill for

An Act to provide for a trial period of daylight saving throughout the State and a referendum thereafter on the question of daylight saving on a permanent basis . . .

There are some other issues, but that is what the Bill is for. Within that scope, there is no opportunity to add additional requirements for demographic information. My ruling is that the amendment as proposed is outside the scope of the Bill, and would have required an instruction to the committee, if the committee was to be empowered to handle it at this stage.
