1. Meeting of Council

The Council assembled at 10.00am pursuant to order.

The President, Hon Alanna Clohesy, took the Chair.

Prayers and an Acknowledgement of Country were read.

2. Ministerial Statement — National Redress Scheme

The Parliamentary Secretary to the Attorney General made a Ministerial Statement with respect to Hon Colin de Grussa bringing to Parliament's attention Ms Bronte Glass' experience in applying for redress as part of the National Redress Scheme. Her application related to historical abuse she suffered when she was a ward of the State.

4. Medical Privacy

Hon Sophia Moermond: To move on the next day of sitting —

That this House notes -

- (a) that all Western Australians have a right to medical privacy; and,
- (b) that the disclosure of private medical information is a personal choice and should not be mandated by the State.

And in so noting, the House supports all citizens' constitutional right to freedom of choice as it relates to their own medical decisions.

5. Western Australian Space Sector

Non-Government Business No. 1 having been called, Hon Sophia Moermond moved, without notice —

That this House expresses its support to the Department of Jobs, Tourism, Science and Innovation for its partnership with the Western Australian space sector and their goal to —

- (a) create high paying jobs and diversify the economy in the exciting area that is the Western Australian space sector;
- (b) drive innovation within our State; and
- (c) inspire a passion for STEM amongst Western Australian students, and

urges the Government to think big, and act even bigger, by making substantial investments in organisations that support this inspiring and growing part of our economy that Western Australia is geographically perfectly poised to take advantage of.

Debate ensued.

6. Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure — Consolidated Account Estimates 2021–2022

7. Constitutional and Electoral Legislation Amendment (Electoral Equality) Bill 2021

8. Questions Without Notice

Questions without notice were taken.

The Minister for Mental Health representing the Minister for Health tabled WA Country Health Service regions Covid-19 vaccination clinics details, in response to question on notice 286 asked by Hon Martin Aldridge. (Tabled Paper 832).

The Minister for Mental Health representing the Minister for Health, in accordance with Standing Order 108(2), advised that an answer to questions on notice 289 asked by Hon James Hayward will be provided by 19 November 2021.

The Minister for Mental Health representing the Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, by leave, incorporated into *Hansard* information in relation to consultation conducted by the Government for the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Bill*, in response to a question without notice asked by Hon Dr Brad Pettitt.

The Minister for Mental Health representing the Minister for Health, by leave, incorporated into *Hansard* information in relation to Health Workers (Restrictions on Access) Directions and reporting by *The West Australian* that these directions are not being adhered to, in response to a question without notice asked by Hon Martin Aldridge.

Point of Order

Hon Nick Goiran raised the following Point of Order —

President, I seek your ruling on an answer provided during question time by the Minister for Mental Health representing the Minister for Police. The Minister in his response referred me to Standing Order 104. Standing Order 104 states, in part —

Questions may be asked of —

- (a) a Minister or Parliamentary Secretary relating to public affairs with which the Minister or Parliamentary Secretary is connected, to proceedings in the Council, or to any matter of administration for which the Minister or Parliamentary Secretary is responsible;

The issue here is that I was seeking information that is in the knowledge of the Commissioner of Police. I was asking whether the Commissioner of Police raised the matter with the previous Minister for Police, not the current one. It appears that the Minister for Police has interpreted that as meaning that he cannot provide that information. If that were true, it would mean that we would be unable to ask any questions of any Minister about historical matters that occurred prior to them taking that ministry. I seek your ruling on this and I appreciate that this may need to be provided on another occasion.

President's Ruling

The President ruled as follows —

Honourable Member, I would need to review the question and the answer and your explanation of your understanding of Standing Order 104, in which case I will take it under advisement and provide a response or ruling to the Chamber at a later date.
