
I thank the Honourable Member for some notice of this question. The following information has been provided to me by the Minister for Police.

The Western Australia Police Force advise:

1 -3

The total number of return-to-prison warrants currently outstanding with the Rapid Apprehension Squad is now 58, as at 16 August 2023. On receipt of these warrants, the WA Police Force assesses investigative opportunities which includes seeking information from the public. This assessment is on a case-by-case basis
